MARK-INGS

Sharon and I flew to Amman, Jordan, in 1988, on a tour through the Holy Lands in a group of 30 Lutheran pastors and spouses. In the emotional impact of walking the Via Dolorosa (Way of Sorrows) in Jerusalem, and seeing the Golden Dome of the great Muslim shrine along with church domes and steeples on the Temple Mount, and sitting in a boat on the Sea of Galilee while reading Matthew's writing called "The Sermon on the Mount", we were surprised by the emotional intensity of the experience. It was more than a tour. It was a pilgrimage, touching to the depths of our souls.

There was another surprise. At the time when hijackings and murder were happening, often connected with the name PLO, "Palestinian" was a name that came to denote "terrorist" in most American minds. We found out that most Christians in what we then called the "West Bank" are Palestinian, friendly, and our sisters and brothers. It was a joyful experience to be with them. We also clearly found out that the stories of war and peace and revenge and long memories of hurtful actions fill all sides in this region, Jewish and Palestinian. We heard stories that deeply moved us to understand how seemingly intractable the situation is and how painful it is for both sides.

So now Sharon and I are returning to that area, Jordan and Palestine and Israel, leaving the middle of this month with new friends from the La Crosse Area and the South Central Synods (Madison) of the ELCA. Rev. Libby Howe of our congregation will be among our traveling companions. We are not retracing our former steps, however. Although we will certainly be at many sites which are deeply imbedded in the faith traditions of our Jewish and Christian ancestors, this time we are looking forward to longer stays in communities where we will listen to stories and concerns from Israeli and Palestinian friends who want to take time to make sure we hear them. We will hear stories of sadness and grief and hope, of war and peace-making, of people wanting their voices to be heard. In Bethlehem and Jerusalem and Nazareth, among other places, we will let our hearts and souls be touched by stories of faith and faithfulness and anger and hurt and disappointment, including with the U.S.

We will be in schools run by our Lutheran friends, and we will gather in Palestine as partners with families who come back together for the annual olive harvest. We will eat new foods, make new friends, learn about new ways that God's people are trying to create a new future in this area. We will be arriving shortly after the debate in the United Nations about recognizing a Palestinian state.

The history of this area is overwhelmingly complex. There are multiple layers of grievances and hurts from many periods: The Crusader years ending in the 1200's, the Turkish period ending in the late 1800's, the British period ending around 1950, and now multiple wars that have been fought involving Egypt, Syria, Jordan and Israel. I won't try to clarify the multiple times peace overtures seem to be offered and then fall apart. A good book to read just to begin to understand the recent history and pain is The Lemon Tree by Sandy Tolan.

Sharon and I want to take gifts. We will see children in schools and homes, and want to leave them with a sign of friendship. I will bring a duffle bag to church on Sunday October 2 and October 9. In it I invite you to place these specific items: small "Matchbox" toys and "Beanie Babies". These are small, fairly uniform items. Children know when they are getting items which differ from others, so similarity in these items is crucial, as is weight. Therefore we will not be accepting any other stuffed animals or toys. But if you want to make a connection with a Palestinian child, I invite your response.

We go with open hearts. I know many times as we share coffee and tea that we will be thinking about coffee and tea time here, wishing all could meet each other. We look forward to meeting courageous people whose names have been in our readings. Somehow we want to be messengers of our great God who is slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love and mercy.

Peace be with you. Shalom. Salaam.

Unapproved Council Minutes for **Thursday, September 8, 2011**

Present: Pr. Mark Jolivet, Rebecca Grapes, Andy Stutesman, Dennis Baehr, Gene Linse, Rod Tisthammer, Cheryl Olson, and Mark Zellmer

Excused: Scott Swedeen and Lois Losby

- A. Meeting called to order at 6:35 p.m.; a quorum was present.
- B. **Devotions** – Pastor provided reflection from Roman's Chapter 13 – why everyone needs Jesus and how we live together.
- C. **Secretary's Report** – Motion made (Linse/Tisthammer) to correct Item F – Constitution Vacancy in the August 11, 2011 meeting minutes as follows:

Motion made by R. Grapes and seconded by C. Olson to accept the Executive Committee unanimous recommendation that the Church Council affirm the Congregational Constitution (Chapter 12, c12.01), which indicates that, by virtue of Mr. Rob Hansen's absence at four consecutive council meetings, he has vacated his chairmanship of the Board of Property. Mr. Hansen's participation as Chairman in current projects shall cease and all church property in his possession, including, but not limited to, keys and credit cards, shall be immediately returned. Following discussion and recommendation was amended by A. Stutesman. Seconded by R. Tisthammer. MSC. The motion reads as follows:

Accept the Executive Committee's unanimous recommendation that the Church Council affirm the Congregational Constitution (Chapter 12, c12.01), which indicates that, by virtue of Mr. Rob Hansen's absence at four consecutive council meetings, he has vacated his chairmanship of the Board of Property. Mr. Hansen's participation as Chairman in current projects shall cease.

The amended motion was voted on by written ballot. Yes – 7, No – 3. Motion carried.

Motion to correct Item F – Constitution Vacancy was approved unanimously. Motion made (Tisthammer/Baehr) to approve the August 11, 2011 minutes as amended. Motion carried unanimously.

- D. **Treasurer's Report** – Dennis Baehr presented the financials through August 31, 2011. Contributions down again in August; still current on bills. Mr. Baehr reported that the line of credit with Coulee Bank does not require an audited financial statement to access if needed.

Discussed adding a line to the Financial Summary/General Account report to include information on the memorial accounts. Motion made (Linse/Stutesman) to add a line item to the monthly Financial Summary/General Account report that identifies the total amount of funds available, income received, funds used, and the current total of all Memorial Accounts on a monthly and year-to-date basis. Motion carried unanimously.

Motion made (Tisthammer/Stutesman) to approve the financial report for the period ended August 31, 2011. Motion carried unanimously.

E. **Pastor's Report**

Welcome to Jessica Zinnel – she is hard at work as the new Youth and Family Ministry Coordinator.

Flooring for Gathering Room underway.

Floor polish/wax/carpets being completed this week.

Confirmation starts 9/7/11 including First Communion classes.

Preparing for Israel/Palestine trip – pastoral schedule reviewed for Sunday services during trip.

There were no numbers to present on visitation this past month; Pastor Skarstad is picking up additional visitations in Pastor Gary's absence.

- F. **Executive Committee** – The Committee met on August 31, 2011 and presented the following information/recommendations to the full Council.

Reviewed the project tracking spreadsheet/report to determine items that could be removed because they have been completed.

Also reviewed the funds spent on specific projects to compare what was budgeted/approved, and to determine funds available from the Lloyd Sparkes, Capellan, Repnik and the "other" category under Capital Campaign. The updated tracking report was presented to the Council for their review.

Carol Bennett, Bookkeeper, will be leaving by mid-October to move to North Dakota. Her husband has accepted a new position.

The Committee discussed the process for filling the position and the process to be used. The *Bookkeeper Services Request for Proposals* document was presented to the Council; it outlines the intent, responsibilities, qualifications, and how to respond to the request. Discussion. Motion made (Linse/Stutesman) to provide authority to the Executive Committee to solicit bids, inter-

view perspective candidate(s), and execute an agreement for congregational accounting/bookkeeping services. Motion carried unanimously.

Two (2) bids have been received for window glazing and painting/renovations/repair services to the exterior of the church and educational building. Bids were within \$50 of each other, and the Council is recommending B & R Painting as the provider (lower bid). The Council previously set aside \$3,000 from the Lloyd Sparkes Estate for such a project. Discussion. Motion made (Grapes/Linse) to designate up to \$9,500 from the Lloyd Sparkes Estate (in addition to the \$3,000 previously designed) to contract with B & R Painting to complete the project. Motion carried unanimously.

The security system in the church is not working properly. Bids were received from Signal Systems (current vendor) and Per Mar. The cost of the security system is already in the budget. Discussion. The Committee unanimously decided to go with Per Mar and to move forward with the project immediately as the lack of a functional security system was perceived to be an emergency requiring expedited Executive Committee approval.

Bids on glass to protect the painting on the stage have been received. The cost of this will be paid by the American Red Cross. The Committee decided to go with the bid from La Crosse Glass.

G. **Board Reports**

Worship & Music (Cheryl Olson) – Provided an update on the Family Choir and noted that the choir will be singing on September 18th. Central's Robed Choir will sing on October 23rd.

Property – Items discussed elsewhere on agenda.

Social Ministry (Rod Tisthammer) – Harvest for Hunger on Saturday, October 2nd; Layettes are due back on September 18th; school kits due back by September 25th; Macy's Shop for a Cause for the Women's Clothes Closet netted \$100 plus exposure; good comments received from OSLC participation at Pride; Come for Supper has two opportunities for assistance – Thrivent Night on September 20th and Heritage Night on September 28th; WCC quilt raffle tickets available; non-food drive (toothpaste to toilet paper) will be held in front of the La Crosse Center on September 28th; crock pot coolies classes to be announced; Crop Walk scheduled for September 9th; and Band Together Warming the Heart scheduled for November 5th.

Christian Ed (Andy Stutesman) – Looking for a Sunday School Superintendent. Jessica Zinniel doing very well in her new position.

Stewardship (Gene Linse) – no report.

H. **Taskforces**

150th (Rod Tisthammer) – Bishop Arends/meal/program on September 18th beginning at 10:00 a.m.; Roger Crum (Son of Congregation) will be here on November 6th at which time we will commission OSLC song along with a choir reunion; Birgitta Rice (Santa Lucia) will be here on December 4th along with the anniversary book and story book.

Fireside Room – final shipments of furniture en route.

Sound System – Still need to purchase laptop, cables and hearing devices.

I. **Old Business**

Project Tracking Report – discussed during Executive Committee report.

Red House PILOT Negotiations and Demolition Permit – Pastor Mark and Mark Zellmer spoke with City Attorney Stephen Matty. PILOT will be based on 20 tax years. City hopes to be done with the PILOT agreement by end of September; document will be sent to OSLC without illustrations and examples. The PILOT agreement needs to be signed by the Mayor and City Clerk.

J. **New Business**

Agenda Items for September 25th Quarterly Meeting – Only additional item(s) suggested for inclusion is a “face lift” (painting) project update.

Meeting Minutes Protocol – Motion made (Stutesman/Baehr) to include Executive Council minutes in packets at all future Council meetings, that motions be delineated in “bold” or “underline” text (Executive and Council minutes), and have them emailed to all Council members as soon as they are drafted. Motion carried unanimously.

Council Membership – Motion made (Stutesman/Baehr) to post Council member names and titles in the newsletter each month and on the OSLC website, and include vacancies when a board or officer position is vacant. Motion carried unanimously.

Property Board Chair Vacancy – Motion made (Stutesman/Linse) to appoint Rob Hansen to fill the vacancy of Property Board Chair. Motion defeated – 3 yes, 5 no.

K. **Adjourn**

Motion made (Tisthammer/Stutesman) to adjourn. Motion carried unanimously. The meeting adjourned at 8:42 p.m.

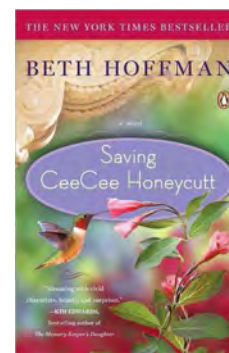


Our book to read for October is *Sarah's Key* by Tatiana de Rosnay

In the summer of 1942, the French police arrested thousands of Jewish families and held them outside of Paris before shipping them off to Auschwitz. On the 60th anniversary of the roundups, an expatriate American journalist covering the atrocities discovers a personal connection - one such family formerly occupied her apartment. She resolves to find out what happened to Sarah, the 10-year-old daughter, who was the only family member to survive. ... De Rosnay's novel is captivating, and the powerful narration gives it even greater impact. (From Publisher's Weekly) Discussion date TBA.

Our book for November will be *Saving CeeCee Honeycutt* by Beth Hoffman.

In Hoffman's charming debut, Cecelia Rose (CeeCee) Honeycutt tells the story of her tragic life and the strong women who stepped in to save her. At age 12, CeeCee realizes her mother, flouncing around Willoughby, OH, in prom dresses and matching shoes, is crazy and the town's laughingstock. Her father is never home, and nothing is going to change so CeeCee buries herself in books as an escape. But her true liberation comes after her mother's tragic death when great-aunt Tootie sweeps CeeCee off to Savannah. There, a group of powerful, independent women offer the young girl love, laughter, and a new chance at life. Readers who enjoy strong female characters will appreciate CeeCee, a survivor despite her heartbreaking childhood, and Aunt Tootie and her friends, all of them steel magnolias...(Library Journal)

150th Anniversary Spotlight for October

In 1996 a UWL student came up with an idea to help provide quality clothes to women who were facing changes in the welfare system. Fifteen years later the Women's Clothes Closet has grown from a small idea to an important mission at Our Savior's.

In the first eight months of 2011 we have responded 1,480 times to the needs of women in our community. This number represents a 23% increase over the first eight months of 2010. Maintaining a store to serve this growing number of women is a huge challenge. The store is professionally managed by Bonnie Newburg who is the face of the WCC. We also have developed an Advisory Board which is comprised of Sharon Jolivette, Kim Shively, Sherry Taylor, Cheryl Vieth, Jane Wood, Rod Tisthammer, Deb Daehn Zellmer and Betty Linse.

The financial support to run our store comes from community members, other church groups in the La Crosse area, grants and in-kind support from Our Savior's Lutheran Church. Throughout the year we have many fund raising events the largest of which is our fall Fashion Cornucopia Style Show. Our fourth annual style show will be held on Saturday, October 29th with the first show at 11 a.m. and the second at 5 p.m. The event includes a sumptuous Moroccan-inspired menu, wine, live music, and featuring clothing from local La Crosse businesses and fashion designers, and a quilt raffle.

Some months ago I was substituting for Bonnie on a Saturday and about to close up the shop when a lady entered our store. I could tell she was nervous and uncomfortable about asking for help. As I helped her pick out clothes she explained the challenges she faced at home. She was recently divorced from an abusive ex-husband and had a three year old son who developed inappropriate language from her ex-husband. On top of those challenges she was in the job market looking for work and facing the prospect of job interviews. This was something she hadn't done for a long time. Her heart breaking story wasn't much different than the stories of so many other women who enter the WCC. The good news is that by the time we were done picking out three complete outfits she was smiling and had a new found sense of confidence, in part because she knew she was going to look good at her interviews and in part because she knew that someone cared. She left having been touched by the caring hands of Our Savior's Lutheran Church and I left knowing it was me who received the greater gift.

Just like Come For Supper was started by Pastor Rachel and Sonja Simonson Schrag with one pan of lasagna, the Women's Clothes Closet was started by a college student who recognized a need and planted the seed. On behalf of your WCC Committee, the Advisory Board, and all of our volunteers and the women of the community we support, **thank you so very much!!!** Without the support of Our Savior's none of this would be possible.

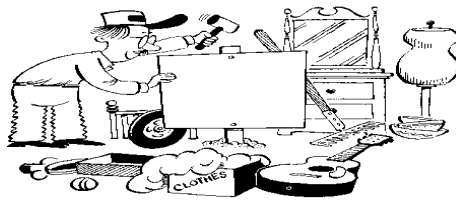
